

From January 13 to January 14, 2021, Data for Progress conducted a survey of 1140 likely voters nationally using web panel respondents. The sample was weighted to be representative of likely voters by age, gender, education, race, and voting history. The survey was conducted in English. The margin of error is ± 2.9 percentage points.

NB: subgroups with a n-size less than 50 (<50) are not shown on these cross-tabs. We choose not to display N<50 subgroups because the sample is too small to have statistical significance. We did, however, take samples of these subgroups for representational and weighting purposes to accurately reflect the electorate makeup. Some values may not add up to 100 due to rounding.

[1] Following last week's riot at the U.S. Capitol, some lawmakers in Congress are calling for the creation of a national commission to investigate the failure of Capitol police to prevent the attack and any ties between police and the riot leaders. It would also propose reforms to the recruitment and practices of the Capitol police.
