

From January 15 to January 19, 2021, Data for Progress conducted a survey of 1164 likely voters nationally using web panel respondents. The sample was weighted to be representative of likely voters by age, gender, education, race, and voting history. The survey was conducted in English. The margin of error is ±2.9 percentage points.

NB: subgroups with a n-size less than 50 (<50) are not shown on these cross-tabs. We choose not to display N<50 subgroups because the sample is too small to have statistical significance. We did, however, take samples of these subgroups for representational and weighting purposes to accurately reflect the electorate makeup. Some values may not add up to 100 due to rounding.

**[3]** In the Spring of 2020, the government sent \$1,200 checks to many Americans. These payments start to phase out for Americans who earn more than \$75,000, or \$150,000 for a joint return. The payments phase out completely for single filers with incomes exceeding \$99,000, \$136,500 for head of household filers with one child and \$198,000 for joint filers with no children.
