From November 24 to 29, 2021, Data for Progress conducted a survey of 1,214 likely voters nationally using web panel respondents. The sample was weighted to be representative of likely voters by age, gender, education, race, and voting history. The survey was conducted in English. The margin of error is ±3 percentage points.

coverage to include hearing, invest in clean energy, extend
tax credits for families with children, and provide subsidies
for child care.
