From December 3 to 8, 2021, Data for Progress conducted a survey of 440 likely voters in Nevada using web panel respondents. The sample was weighted to be representative of likely voters by age, gender, education, race, and voting history. The survey was conducted in English. The margin of error is ±5 percentage points.

NB: subgroups with a n-size less than 50 (<50) are not shown on these cross-tabs. We choose not to display N<50 subgroups because the sample is too small to have statistical significance. We did, however, take samples of these subgroups for representational and weighting purposes to accurately reflect the electorate makeup. Some values may not add up to 100 due to rounding.

[5] Democrats in Congress are debating between providing Dreamers, immigrant essential workers, and other undocumented immigrants an earned, permanent pathway to citizenship or temporary work permits and protection from deportation in the Build Back Better agenda. The Senate parliamentarian, an unelected advisor to Senators, recently said that an earned, permanent path to citizenship cannot be passed through the Senate with a simple majority of 51 votes.

Democrats who want to **compromise** with the parliamentarian are proposing temporary work permits and protection from deportation, and say that these benefits will still provide undocumented immigrants with more security and certainty while still following the Senate's rules.

Democrats who want to **move forward** with an earned, permanent path to citizenship say that limited protections are not enough and that immigrants who have contributed to our country for decades need a permanent solution, no matter what it takes to deliver them.
