

From February 19 to February 22, 2021, Data for Progress conducted a survey of 1527 likely voters nationally using web panel respondents. The sample was weighted to be representative of likely voters by age, gender, education, race, and voting history. The survey was conducted in English. The margin of error is ±2.5 percentage points.

NB: subgroups with a n-size less than 50 (<50) are not shown on these cross-tabs. We choose not to display N<50 subgroups because the sample is too small to have statistical significance. We did, however, take samples of these subgroups for representational and weighting purposes to accurately reflect the electorate makeup. Some values may not add up to 100 due to rounding.

[6] The current federal minimum wage is \$7.25 an hour. As part of a pandemic relief bill, some lawmakers in Congress are proposing gradually raising the minimum wage so that in 2025, the minimum wage is \$15 an hour. To pass this bill would require using a non-standard procedure that allows legislation to pass the Senate with a simple majority. This process would enable one party to pass the bill without the support of the other party.
