

DATA FOR **PROGRESS**

From March 13 to March 21, 2021, Data for Progress conducted a survey of 669 likely voters in New York using web panel respondents. The sample was weighted to be representative of likely voters by age, gender, education, race, and voting history. The survey was conducted in English. The margin of error is ± 4 percentage points.

NB: subgroups with a n-size less than 50 (<50) are not shown on these cross-tabs. We choose not to display N<50 subgroups because the sample is too small to have statistical significance. We did, however, take samples of these subgroups for representational and weighting purposes to accurately reflect the electorate makeup. Some values may not add up to 100 due to rounding.

[1] New York State faces a projected deficit of tens of billions of dollars in the coming years. How would you prefer the state close this deficit?

[2] Some lawmakers are considering a package of new taxes on the wealthiest of New Yorkers to patch the state's projected multi-billion dollar budget shortfall. This package could include the following taxes:

A Progressive Income Tax that raises the income tax rate of New Yorkers earning more than \$300,000 per year. This would generate an estimated \$15 billion annually. A Capital Gains Tax that taxes income from investments like stocks the same as wages. This would generate an estimated \$7 billion annually.

An Heirs' Tax that would raise taxes on the inherited wealth of millionaires. This would generate an estimated \$8 billion annually.

A Billionaires' Tax that would tax money made by billionaires on their investments, paid annually instead of when the investments are sold. This would generate an estimated \$23 billion in the first year, and \$1.3 billion annually thereafter.

A Corporate Tax that would repeal the Trump tax cuts by restoring taxes on the profit a corporation makes each year. This would generate an estimated \$9 billion annually.

A Wall Street Tax that would place small taxes on trades of stocks, bonds, and derivatives. This would generate an estimated \$9 billion annually.

When combined, this package of taxes would generate \$50 billion to address New York's projected multi-year deficit and invest in health care, education, and other services.
