

From April 9 to April 12, 2021, Data for Progress conducted a survey of 1217 likely voters nationally using web panel respondents. The sample was weighted to be representative of likely voters by age, gender, education, race, and voting history. The survey was conducted in English. The margin of error is ±3 percentage points.

NB: subgroups with a n-size less than 50 (<50) are not shown on these cross-tabs. We choose not to display N<50 subgroups because the sample is too small to have statistical significance. We did, however, take samples of these subgroups for representational and weighting purposes to accurately reflect the electorate makeup. Some values may not add up to 100 due to rounding.

[1] In 2017, the tax code was changed so that individuals could deduct only up to \$10,000 of their state and local tax bill from the amount they owed in federal income taxes. Some lawmakers in Congress are now proposing repealing this change to the tax code so that individuals can deduct any amount of state and local taxes from their federal income taxes. This change to the tax code primarily benefits the wealthiest 5% of Americans.
