From April 23 to 25, 2021, Data for Progress conducted a survey of 1,189 likely voters nationally using web panel respondents. The sample was weighted to be representative of likely voters by age, gender, education, race, and voting history. The survey was conducted in English. The margin of error is  $\pm 3$  percentage points.

<p><b>[1]</b> The American Rescue Plan, a \$1.9 trillion pandemic relief package signed into law in March 2021, expanded the child tax credit for most families. Families receiving this tax credit will get a check of \$250 to \$300 each month beginning this July, rather than getting the money in a lump sum when they file their taxes next year. The sample was weighted to be representative of likely voters by age, gender, education, race, and voting history. The survey was conducted in English. The margin of error is  $\pm 3$  percentage points.

**[1]** Some policymakers are proposing expanding the **child tax credit** so that it provides families up to **\$250 per month** for each child 17 and under – and **\$300 per month** for each child they have under 6 years of age. The proposal would be available to all middle-class and low-income families of most incomes.

**[2]** The expanded **child tax credit** is a policy that it provides families up to \$3,000 per year for each child 17 and under – and \$3,600 for each child they have under 6 years of age. The proposal would be available to all middle-class and low-income families of most incomes.

This expansion will be paid for by raising taxes on Americans making more than \$400,000 and Americans who make over \$1 million through investments in things like stocks and bonds.
