

DATA FOR **PROGRESS**

From May 12 to 25, 2021, Data for Progress conducted a survey of 2,100 likely voters nationally using web panel respondents. The sample was weighted to be representative of likely voters by age, gender, education, race, and voting history. The survey was conducted in English. The margin of error is ± 2 percentage points.

NB: subgroups with a n-size less than 50 (<50) are not shown on these cross-tabs. We choose not to display N<50 subgroups because the sample is too small to have statistical significance. We did, however, take samples of these subgroups for representational and weighting purposes to accurately reflect the electorate makeup. Some values may not add up to 100 due to rounding.

[1] Some cities are rethinking the role of their police departments. Under these proposals, cities would reassign traffic enforcement duties to another agency and route certain 911 calls — related to homelessness, mental health, minor crime, and substance abuse — to unarmed civil officers, social workers, counselors, and EMTs. Police would still respond to situations that involve serious felonies or significant acts of violence.
