

DATA FOR PROGRESS **CLIMATE POWER**

From August 20 to 23, 2021, Data for Progress conducted a survey of 711 likely voters in HI-01, OR-05, NJ-05, ME-02, GA-07, TX-15, TX-28, TX-34, and CA-16 using SMS and web panel respondents. The sample was weighted to be representative of likely voters by age, gender, education, race, and voting history. The survey was conducted in English. The margin of error is ±3 percentage points.

N=711 unless otherwise specified. Some values may not add up to 100 due to rounding.
