

DATA FOR PROGRESS

On January 11, 2022, Data for Progress conducted a survey of 1,326 likely voters nationally using web panel respondents. The sample was weighted to be representative of likely voters by age, gender, education, race, and voting history. The survey was conducted in English. The margin of error is ±3 percentage points.

N=1,326 unless otherwise specified. Some values may not add up to 100 due to rounding.

[1] The Build Back Better Act is a proposal to invest \$1.75
trillion over the next ten years to better fund long-term care
for seniors and people with disabilities, expand Medicare
coverage to include hearing, invest in clean energy, extend
tax credits for families with children, and provide subsidies
for child care.

[2] The Build Back Better Act will be paid for by raising taxes on multimillionaires and billionaires, making sure large corporations pay at least 15% in taxes, taxing corporations that purchase their own stock, and funding tax enforcement to make sure the wealthy and corporations pay all the taxes that they owe.
