

DATA FOR **PROGRESS**

From February 11 to 13, 2022, Data for Progress conducted a survey of 1,144 likely voters nationally using web panel respondents. The sample was weighted to be representative of likely voters by age, gender, education, race, and voting history. The survey was conducted in English. The margin of error is ± 3 percentage points.
