

From March 30 to April 4, 2022, Data for Progress conducted a survey of 801 likely voters in New York using web panel respondents. The sample was weighted to be representative of likely voters by age, gender, education, race, region, and voting history. The survey was conducted in English. The margin of error is ±3 percentage points.

NB: subgroups with a n-size less than 50 (<50) are not shown on these cross-tabs. We choose not to display N<50 subgroups because the sample is too small to have statistical significance. We did, however, take samples of these subgroups for representational and weighting purposes to accurately reflect the electorate makeup. Some values may not add up to 100 due to rounding.

[1] Currently in New York, tipped workers in bars and restaurants can be paid just two-thirds of the minimum wage. This means they typically rely on tips for their remaining income.

Some state lawmakers are proposing a bill to require that employers pay tipped workers the full minimum wage. Any tips workers receive would be in addition to the minimum wages they receive.
