

DATA FOR PROGRESS

From June 22 to July 8, 2022, Data for Progress conducted a survey of 903 likely voters in New Hampshire using SMS and webpanel respondents. The sample was weighted to be representative of likely voters by age, gender, education, race, and voting history. The survey was conducted in English. The margin of error is ± 3 percentage points.

N=903 unless otherwise specified. Some values may not add up to 100 due to rounding.
