From September 29 to October 2, 2023, Data for Progress conducted a survey of 1,216 likely voters nationally using web panel respondents. The sample was weighted to be representative of likely voters by age, gender, education, race, geography, and voting history. The survey was conducted in English. The margin of error is ±3 percentage points.

NB: subgroups with a n-size less than 50 (<50) are not shown on these cross-tabs. We choose not to display N<50 subgroups because the sample is too small to have statistical significance. We did, however, take samples of these subgroups for representational and weighting purposes to accurately reflect the electorate makeup. Some values may not add up to 100 due to rounding.

[10] Auditors from the Department of Defense have found that the U.S. military has regularly paid private defense contractors significantly more money than necessary for goods and services.

This includes paying \$71 for a pin that could have been purchased for \$0.04, and \$1,700 for a ramp gate roller assembly that could have been purchased for \$8.

Some lawmakers have proposed legislation to require private defense contractors to prove that their prices are aligned with what it actually costs to make an item.
