

# DATA FOR **PROGRESS**

From November 20 to 21, 2023, Data for Progress conducted a survey of 1,203 U.S. likely voters nationally using web panel respondents. The sample was weighted to be representative of likely voters by age, gender, education, race, geography, and voting history. The survey was conducted in English. The margin of error is  $\pm 3$  percentage points.

NB: subgroups with a n-size less than 50 (<50) are not shown on these cross-tabs. We choose not to display N<50 subgroups because the sample is too small to have statistical significance. We did, however, take samples of these subgroups for representational and weighting purposes to accurately reflect the electorate makeup. Some values may not add up to 100 due to rounding.

**[8]** Carbon dioxide emissions are caused by industrial activities, like burning fuel. These emissions can impact the planet, causing the Earth to warm and changing our global climate over time.

Some governments and private industries have begun buying and selling units of carbon dioxide emissions, otherwise known as carbon credits. Many businesses, governments, and consumers purchase carbon credits to address the climate pollution they create.

There is currently no global market that regulates these carbon credits, including verifying that carbon is accurately accounted for in these markets and enforcing rules on buyers and sellers that exist in other kinds of global trading markets.
