

DATA FOR PROGRESS

From December 15 to 18, 2023, Data for Progress conducted a survey of 1,169 U.S. likely voters nationally using web panel respondents. The sample was weighted to be representative of likely voters by age, gender, education, race, geography, and voting history. The survey was conducted in English. The margin of error is ± 3 percentage points.

NB: subgroups with a n-size less than 50 (<50) are not shown on these cross-tabs. We choose not to display N<50 subgroups because the sample is too small to have statistical significance. We did, however, take samples of these subgroups for representational and weighting purposes to accurately reflect the electorate makeup. Some values may not add up to 100 due to rounding.

[1] Abortion pills are currently available by mail for patients wanting an abortion up to 10 weeks into pregnancy. In addition to in-person appointments, patients are currently able to receive the medication by mail following an online appointment with a health care provider.

[3] Currently, abortion pills are the most-used method for abortion and are accessible through telehealth, mail delivery, and pharmacy pickup.
