## **M** DATA FOR **PROGRESS**

From October 18 to 19, 2023, Data for Progress conducted a survey of 1,329 U.S. likely voters nationally using web panel respondents. The sample was weighted to be representative of likely voters by age, gender, education, race, geography, and voting history. The survey was conducted in English. The margin of error is ±3 percentage points.

NB: subgroups with a n-size less than 50 (<50) are not shown on these cross-tabs. We choose not to display N<50 subgroups because the sample is too small to have statistical significance. We did, however, take samples of these subgroups for representational and weighting purposes to accurately reflect the electorate makeup. Some values may not add up to 100 due to rounding.

**[8]** After most elections in the U.S., election officials conduct a series of post-election audits to check equipment and procedures to ensure election practices functioned properly and the results are accurate.

In post-election audits, election officials directly compare paper ballots or records with results produced by the voting machines. Post-election audits are mandatory in most states.

**[10]** The Electronic Registration Information Center (ERIC) is a tool used in 25 states to help keep voter lists accurate and catch potential voter eligibility issues quickly.

ERIC compares voter registrations with data from the U.S. Postal Service, Department of Motor Vehicles, and the Social Security Administration. Their cross-analysis catches inaccurate voter registration and removes deceased and ineligible voters from voter rolls.
